

The last meeting of the year will be on December 4th and will take the form of a Christmas Party. We will be making our own entertainment!




Frodsham Methodist Book Group Book Review

As a history lover this book was right up my street, the story of the sixteenth century Lucrezia di Cosimo de'Medici and her short marriage to Alfonso, Duke of Ferrara. The marriage portrait of the title is taken from Robert Browning's poem 'My Last Duchess'.

The book starts at the end, as it were, with Lucrezia realising that her husband 'intends to kill her', and flips back and to in time, telling the story of her life and how she came to that point. The book led to an

interesting discussion on the rights of women, all of us being grateful to have been born now and not in the sixteenth century! Things have definitely improved since then, though there is still some way to go. Even if you were lucky enough to be born into a wealthy family, women were in reality just the possessions of their male relations. In England it wasn't until the Married Women's Property Act in 1882 that women were able to own and control property in their own right.

Festival of Food, Flowers and Farming

On September 23rd and 24th we held a Festival of Food, Flowers and Farming. We wanted a more traditional theme for Harvest Festival this year. We also wanted to show how farming had changed and show some of the ways in which local farmers have diversified. We also invited eco-friendly stall holders where possible, as part of our drive to become an eco-church.



The church was beautifully decorated with stunning floral arrangements created by Jan, Shelley and Liz. Your hard work was very much appreciated and there were some lovely comments.

On Saturday 23rd September we held an information fair; in the church we had a series of talks:-

Ruth Basden from Climate Action Frodsham spoke about Meals to Beat Climate Change and how our food choices can make a

difference.



Barbara Freeman from Fresh Beginnings spoke about her work teaching people to cook from scratch and how this can save money and improve people's health.

Mark O'Sullivan spoke about the Community Orchards in Frodsham. I don't think any of us knew there were five of them.

Dr Richard Cox gave a very interesting talk about llamas generally and how they came to this country, and also about his own herd - Hillview Llamas.

Imogen Harrison spoke about setting up Firs Flower Farm and how she uses regenerative farming techniques that she learnt about in South Africa. In the hall we had various stalls from local food producers, including Larkton Hall Cheese, North Cheshire Bee-keepers and Cheshire Pick Your Own Pumpkins. We also had a church produce stall selling preserves. Thank you to everyone who donated produce and preserves for this.



We had information stands and displays by Frodsham Christmas Trees, Log Club, Delamere Flower Farm and Firs Flower Farm. We were also joined by local community groups to raise awareness of their work; these included Climate Action Frodsham and the Women's Ag Group. The WI had a display showing their work at Manley Copse and our friends from Opal also had a fund-raising stall selling knitted pumpkins etc.

We also had a representative from the local Foodbank, who was very appreciative of all the regular donations made by our members.

In the craft room there was a display of historic photographs kindly loaned by the Local History Society and the Worrall family, which showed Frodsham food shops and farms from the past.

The event was well attended, with a steady flow of visitors throughout the day. Our MP Mike Amesbury also came along to show his support. He listened to one of the talks and spent time talking to many of the stall

holders.

The ladies in the kitchen did an excellent job providing cakes and drinks.

The Harvest Festival on Sunday was led by Liz Holmes; it was a traditional service which included many old favourite Harvest hymns. After the service the flowers were distributed to local care homes, and to church members who weren't able to attend, and were greatly appreciated.

A big thank you to everyone who attended, helped or was involved in any way. It was a lovely weekend.

Anti-Slavery Day

The idea for the pop-up exhibition came about when I laid out a series of my screen prints on the church craft room floor to take some photos one Wednesday morning last summer. A weekend was agreed, and the display went ahead on Saturday the 21st October.





At the planning stage we decided to involve a local school. We contacted Frodsham Primary Academy on Ship Street, and they agreed to bring up a group of year 6 students to see my screen prints on the Friday before the open day, and to participate in a printmaking workshop in the craft room, which

my wife Liz and I turned into a studio for the morning.

The weather on the morning of the workshop was awful, so the full complement of children was unable to walk up to the church, but two members of school staff each brought up four students. They were given a brief explanation of the morning's events as they tucked into a breakfast. The children were very engaged at every stage, proving highly interested in the theme and engrossed hands-on in printing the flyers and posters, with well thought-out supporting text. We were all impressed with their knowledge and application. Well done teachers!









I had held back some of the students' work and formed a miniexhibition of their achievements, which we displayed during our exhibition on the Saturday.

By the time I was due to talk about my prints the hall was full. Far more people took an interest than I had anticipated, with around 70



attending, including a really good presence from the Ukrainian families who settled in the area in 2022, and who have regularly joined us for drop-in mornings and special events.

I talked about the screen-printing process and how my interest in the Liverpool Pierhead and waterfront (that I had been painting over the last 15

years) gradually evolved into a concentration on the city heritage and the slaving trade, as depicted and recorded by exhibits in the National Museums Merseyside. A range of other buildings on the shoreline and through the city were part of the exhibition. All of these items, small and large, were underpinned by the wealth of the city traders and merchants gained from 'the African trade'.

As Covid restricted our movements from March 2020, I worked exclusively on the slaving history of the area, in order to raise my awareness of the invidious and deeply integrated nature of the trade, which was supported by Parliament and the Royal African Company from the early 17th century. Liverpool had become, by the early 18th century, the leading world port at the start of the triangular trade to

West Africa and the Americas, then back to Liverpool with vessels full of the crops that the captured Africans produced on the plantations.



World Scouting Jamboree

I spent such a long time preparing for this trip... training... fundraising... teambuilding... nearly two years in the planning and we finally made it.

The 12-hour flight to Incheon Airport was nothing like I'd ever experienced before. Touching down in Korea for the first time was the best feeling in the world, the realisation that all that work had been worthwhile.

Our entire UK Contingent all had identical holdalls and rucksacks; you can imagine the chaos it caused in the airports and tube system!!



Four days were spent exploring the vibrant city, visiting the North Seoul Tower, Gyeongbokgung Palace, The Jeonghyeon Tombs, and a mind-blowing aquarium. We tried so many foods, from Korean savoury dumplings to octopus and Korean BBQ's.

The weather, as you may have seen, was quite extreme... from typhoons and monsoons to severe heat waves and high humidity levels, we had it all!

A slight delay in reaching the Jamboree site was due to the aftermath of a monsoon. The dedicated International Support Team members worked tirelessly to make the site safe, digging trenches and draining the water-they couldn't be commended highly enough!

The opening ceremony was nothing short of spectacular. Greeted by a drone display, fireworks, the Head of the Korean Scouting Association, and The Chief Scout, Bear Grylls, the atmosphere was absolutely incredible.

However... reality hit hard the following morning as we awoke to sweltering tents. The searing heat, coupled with stifling humidity, exposed several onsite challenges. Sanitation facilities were very poor, sand blanketed everything, and incomplete cables hung from power lines. Shade was a luxury we unfortunately lacked. Despite the physical and emotional challenges, our unit pulled together as one, and we really were like a huge family, looking after each other when times got very tough.



On August 5th, at 11pm Korean time, news of the UK Contingent's withdrawal from the Jamboree arrived with gutwrenching emotion. It felt as if all our dedication and effort had been for nothing, and I won't lie, it was incredibly hard news to process. However, we held our heads high, and the remaining 24 hours on site were a whirlwind of spirited trading and cultural interaction, a big finale of the Jamboree site before Jamboree 2.0 in Seoul.

Returning to the city, we were greeted by a swarm of paparazzi, their cameras clicking everywhere we went! But over the next 48 hours the frenzy subsided, which allowed us to relish our stay in a breathtaking, 5-star, 40-storey skyscraper of a hotel!

The next 10 days were a tour of Seoul, from the Yongsan Mall to the Korean War Memorial (where we paid our respects to all the



fallen soldiers in the Korean war), each location offering a unique glimpse into Korean culture. A visit to the Demilitarised Zone provided a big reminder of the divided peninsula, which we all were able to reflect over in some harrowing history, while an underground tunnel brought us right into the North Korean border. This was a feeling and experience nothing like we'd ever imagined.

Our Seoul adventure was concluded with a wonderful spa experience, leaving us all feeling the most weightless and relaxed we'd ever felt.

We had a 14-hour flight home, which enabled us time to look back on our trip of a lifetime, filled with unexpected twists and unforgettable moments. But most of all, the bond between each and every person in our unit is out of this world; from leaders to young people, we've shared something that will stay with us forever and ever. Our Jamboree experience will without any doubt go down in Scouting history, but despite the gruelling challenges, it was still an experience more than I had ever hoped for.

This incredible adventure was made possible by Scouting, an organisation that provides opportunities that people dream about. As I reflect on this chapter of my life, I am so grateful for all your support that helped me towards this goal. Here's to the next exciting adventure that awaits!

And just one more thing...

Life is what you make it. I made WSJ my life for the last two years, and it was the best decision I could have made. I returned from Korea a changed



person. Throughout this whole journey I have grown and shared experiences with the best people ever, and it all stemmed from that first click to send off my application. Take every opportunity life throws at you, because it can take you in so many directions. This experience has changed my life, and it will stay with me to the day I die!

Frodsham Methodist Church thanks everyone who has given a food donation into the hamper and/or given donations to the Foodbank.

This Foodbank is part of a National network across the UK run by the Trussell Trust, registered by the Charities Commission and partnered by local churches. The Foodbank is a Christian organisation serving and working with people of all faith groups and beliefs or none. Part of the underlying Foodbank ethos is that everyone has a right to have food on their plate.

Particularly required at the moment are:

Tinned meat/tinned fish/sponge puddings/rice puddings/custard/jam/biscuits/UHT milk/coffee/tinned tomatoes/tins of soup, and toiletries.

In the month of August, 438 people received food from this particular Foodbank, who say that "the generosity of our volunteers and supporters is the life-blood to many within our community. Your continued support and donations are greatly appreciated."

Last year nearly 200 people in Frodsham were supported by this service.

At the recent Festival of Food, Flowers and Farming many people donated food or money. We are grateful to Alan Gerrard who delivered the donations to the Foodbank, as he does every week.

I have played various leading lady parts and ensemble, as well as taking on general committee roles. I have directed and I put together many of the 'concert' type shows that have been performed. I am really

excited to be directing our February show, 'Beautiful'. This has only just been released for Amateurs, so it's a 'first' for Societies in the Northwest.

The Zodiac is now in its 55th year and is a real showcase for local talent.





Have scarce enough to drink and eat.






